Welcome to the INTRUTH Bible Study on James.

Studying the Word of God transforms lives!

The Bible is God's message of redemption, as well as our instruction book for life. God wants us to search the Bible so we can understand the TRUTH of His character and His desire for us. More than any other book in the New Testament, James places the spotlight on the necessity for believers to act in accordance with our faith.

This study includes 5 lessons, a cover sheet and a dictionary. Each lesson has a memory verse, 15-20 questions, a Take Away and a Blessing. They are written with the New Living Translation (NLT), but any translation will add to your experience.

These lessons are beneficial to anyone but are geared toward 10-15 year olds. This age group is experiencing major changes developmentally - physically, emotionally, socially and spiritually. It is a time of having questions about God, about self and about where they fit in the world. These lessons were created to help students think critically and wrestle through who they are and what they believe.

Teenagers are inundated with technology but starving for relationships. If possible, complete the lesson on your own and then discuss it together to learn from each other.

James is a letter from Jesus' brother to the early church in Jerusalem about the hypocrisy happening among Christians. Like a lot of us today, the people of the early church struggled with committing every part of their lives to Jesus. Our spiritual lives grow when we listen to God's Word and follow it wholeheartedly. As Jesus works in us, He begins to work through us and we begin to think differently and act differently.

May the Lord use these lessons to help you develop a personal, life-long love for God's Word and encourage you to connect in a community that prays, supports and shares life together!

James

Scholars believe James, the younger brother of Jesus (son of Mary and Joseph) likely wrote this book, the first book written for the New Testament. Even though the letter is addressed to first century Christians it gives advice just as important to us today.

James wrote to believers, so the letter doesn't present the message of salvation. Instead he emphasizes how people who already trust in Christ should live. James focuses on real issues that believers face: temptation, anger, favoritism, careless words, quarrelling, boasting, and patience. God knows we're not perfect, but He expects us, with help from the Holy Spirit, to strive to be like Jesus. God wants to change our lives—at home, school, playing sports, on the computer, everywhere.

James shows us that when acts of love are lacking, faith is lacking. If someone "claims to have faith but has no deeds" James says that faith is false. Genuine faith joins us with Jesus Christ so that the power of the Holy Spirit can work in our thoughts and actions. "Words only" faith has no saving power.

What do you think the biggest challenge is to living a Godly life? The tongue - our words. The problem of the tongue is universal. The "tongue" applies to all communication, whether spoken, typed in a computer, or some other means. Just as our actions reveal if our faith is alive, so our speech reveals if our hearts are pure. The life of faith must have action (James 2) and Holy Spirit controlled conversation (James 3).

James wrote to Christians who had problems. These Christians favored rich people, couldn't control their tongues, fought with each other, etc. James ends chapter 3 talking about peace and starts chapter 4 talking about fights. Battles in the world as well as in the church begin with spiritual battles in our hearts. Selfish Christians lack power in their prayers.

Another cause for conflict in the church is "friendship with the world." James 4 calls Christians who adopt the world's philosophy "adulterous people." When we conform to the world around us we are unfaithful to our Lord. James goes on to point out that God gives grace to the humble. It takes grace and humility for people to submit. Arrogant people can't see their own needs. They think they have it all when they are spiritually poor, blind and naked (Revelation 3:17). Humility draws us to God; pride makes Him our opponent.

James 5 gives straight-forward advice about health, wealth, prayer, and pain. James also inserts some subtle warnings about the last days, Christ's return, and judgment. At the close of his letter James gives us an urgent reminder that we live in a fallen world,

but we live for a life beyond this world.

Scripture tells us to pray directly to God (1 Timothy 2:5 and Hebrews 4:14-16), but James shares the value of having godly believers pray for us. The Apostle Paul asked God for healing and God said, "No" in order to demonstrate grace through Paul's weakness. Healing can be a difficult subject, but we don't want to miss God's healing because we never asked for it (James 4:2).

James closes his letter by asking us to bring anyone who drifts from the faith back into belief. We should do this in gentle humility and with the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

How well do your actions mirror the faith that you proclaim? This is a question that we all struggle to answer well.

As you study the letter from James, focus on each area that he mentions: your actions during trials, your treatment of those less fortunate, the way you speak and relate to others, and the role that money plays in how you live your life.

As you can see the book of James gives practical advice for the believer in living out what one believes. May you be blessed and inspired as you read and study the book of James.

slander	to make an evil, false statement about someone that could hurt his/her reputation.
sovereign	having complete power and authority.
Spirit	see Holy Spirit (HS).
submit	to submit to others means respecting a person's authority; to submit to God means surrendering our own will to His; submitting is ongoing with every choice.
swear	to promise by something holy that you are telling the truth.
temptation	anything that attracts a person to do something unwise, wrong, or opposed to God's will.
transformation	God's promise and His work in believers' lives - radical and thorough change, both outward and inward to be more like Jesus.
trials/troubles	struggles or hard times that all Christians go through. God can use these hard times as opportunities to strengthen and mature our faith by causing us to depend more fully on Him.
Truth	God's Word is truth. It comes from God and can be trusted; genuine; honest; reliable; Jesus is called the Truth.
unity	harmony; in agreement; together with like purposes.
wisdom	God-given understanding; the ability to distinguish between right and wrong; comes from God.

As dark and scary as it might feel during a time of trial, testing, and transformation, it's also an opportunity to discover our strengths and gifts, and to endure.

What trials are you experiencing right now? What is Jesus teaching you? Pray that this season will bring you closer to Jesus.

Our actions speak louder than words. We can say we love Jesus, but if our love for Jesus doesn't change how we live, how much do we really love Him? Faith and works go hand in hand. As Jesus works in us, He begins to work through us. Jesus changes the way we look at other people, giving us a desire to serve others and tell people about Him.



Wisdom from God



The root problem with our tongue is our sinful heart. We must let the Holy Spirit renew and clean our hearts every day.

Words, once spoken, cannot be unsaid. Kids on playgrounds like to say, "sticks and stones may break my bones, but words will never hurt me." But the saying cannot be further from the truth. Words can hurt. They do hurt. We all remember times when people have spoken hurtful things to us, and that hurt may still be there.

Commit to praying daily for your words this week.

James tells us that there are two different sets of wisdom because the assumptions about life we base our decisions on are different. Different beliefs lead to radically different conclusions.

Do you want to make decisions with "earthly, unspiritual, demonic" wisdom? The one who follows worldly wisdom is doing exactly that. We must instead critically evaluate every decision we make and most importantly evaluate our lives to see if they are in line with our beliefs.

Worldliness Against God

James 4 tells us how to live in this fallen world.

The world's system of thought is contrary to the Bible and righteous living. Therefore friendship with the world is hostile towards God. We must choose one or the other.

God is opposed to the proud, but gives grace to the humble, so we should humble ourselves so we don't find ourselves opposed to God.

Every decision we make is an opportunity to step closer to God or a step farther away

from Him. When we make the decision to do what's right over what is easy, we draw near to God and our ability to resist temptation increases.

God does not want believers to criticize and judge others. When we judge, we make conclusions on the basis of our opinions. God alone is the judge and has the power to save or to destroy.

Verse 17 says, "Remember it is a sin to know what you ought to do an then not do it."

The Lord loves to provide for His kids, and He loves to see us smile. But nothing we experience on earth will come close to what it will be like to spend eternity in heaven.

In summary of the book, James teaches us the necessity of practicing our faith in Jesus

Christ and points out ways to demonstrate that faith. We learned that "faith without deeds is dead" (2:26), but we also know that deeds without faith is useless. Faith, not works, forms the foundation of our lives in Christ (Ephesians 2:8-9). Our salvation lies in what Christ did—not what we do. We must daily give control of our lives our tongues, our money, our today and tomorrows—to God, asking Him for wisdom, power, patience and self-control.

Will you ask your God to help you live out all that you've studied in this book? Let your faith show!
