Welcome to the INTRUTH Bible Study on Joshua.

Studying the Word of God transforms lives!

The Bible is God's message of redemption, as well as our instruction book for life. God wants us to search the Bible so we can understand the TRUTH of His character and His desire for us. The book of Joshua records Israel's journey to the Promised Land. God's promises were being fulfilled before the people's eyes.

This study includes 6 lessons, a cover sheet, a commentary, a dictionary and a map of Canaan. Each lesson has a memory verse, 15-20 questions, a Take Away and a Blessing. They are written with the New Living Translation (NLT), but any translation will add to your experience.

These lessons are beneficial to anyone but are geared toward 10-15 year olds. This age group is experiencing major changes developmentally - physically, emotionally, socially and spiritually. It is a time of having questions about God, about self and about where they fit in the world. These lessons were created to help students think critically and wrestle through who they are and what they believe.

Teenagers are inundated with technology but starving for relationship. If possible, complete the lesson on your own and then discuss it together to learn from each other.

Six truths revealed through studying Joshua:

- 1. God fulfills His promises.
- 2. Obedience to God, no matter what, always yields the greatest rewards.
- 3. God fights for His people.
- 4. God is a God of miracles then and now.
- 5. Sin will be judged.
- 6. When we follow Jesus, we serve the true God, but we have a choice as to who we will serve.

May the Lord use these lessons to help you develop a personal, life-long love for God's Word and encourage you to connect in a community that prays, supports and shares life together!


Content

Joshua is a war epic – a "blood and guts" kind of story but too inspiring to pass up. Basically, while the Hebrews (Israelites) were slaves in Egypt, other people settled on their land. So the Hebrews had to fight to get their land back. The book of Joshua is the record of those battles and Joshua was the name of the man who led the Hebrews into battles. He was a soldier, a diplomat, a negotiator, and a strategist. He believed God even when the odds were stacked up so high against his people that almost everyone else chickened out. He was a real hero.

What's the Point?

The book of Joshua matters to you today for several reasons. We face the same kind of battles that they faced - temptations that are too big for us to conquer alone and difficult times that feel like they are going to overwhelm us. The lesson for us in our battles is the same as the lesson for the Hebrews: Trust God to do your fighting for you. Take it one step at a time. Continually renew your commitment to obey Him and worship Him alone.

-Commentary -

Joshua

After Moses dies, the Lord commissions Joshua to cross over the Jordan and lead His people into the Promised Land. Joshua sends two spies into the first city, Jericho, and learns that everyone who lives in the land is panicking because of the them. Miraculously the Jordan River parts and they are able to cross over on dry ground.

After circumcising the men and celebrating Passover, it is time to capture the land. Joshua has an encounter with the Lord where he realizes that God will be the one to fight the battles if the people will follow and obey Him. Not always do the Israelites obey the Lord. Achan defies God's command to give all the plunder to Him by stealing some of it for himself. His severe judgement is a reminder that all sin, whether that of the Canaanites or the Israelites, will be dealt with appropriately. Numerous battles are won, miracles abound and the land is secured.

Joshua divides the land at the Lord's command, specifying boundaries and borders. Finally, before he dies, Joshua appeals to the people, warning them to stay faithful to the Lord and destroy all idols.

God keeps His word. His promise to Abraham in Genesis was fulfilled in the book of Joshua. We can trust Him; we can trust His written word and we can trust that He will complete the work that He has begun in us (Philippians 1:6). God was patient and long-suffering. Along the way, there were many occasions of sin and failure, yet God's plan and promise was ultimately fulfilled.

In this life, we will have many battles. They will not necessarily be physical battles but they will nonetheless be times of intense conflict and struggle. In these times, it is important to remember the lessons from Joshua: God is able to fight our battles for us; we need to trust Him and we need to do what Joshua did: meditate day and night upon the Word of the Lord, don't be afraid, and be strong and courageous.

God takes sin seriously; it comes with a high price tag, as Achan learned. We must fear the Lord and fight against a casual attitude toward sin. It breaks our relationship with God.

We are faced with a choice. We can serve the Lord, as Joshua and his family did, or we can serve gods of our own choosing, as most of the Israelites eventually did. The choice we make is a daily choice. Choosing to serve the Lord means that we are choosing to meditate on His word, obey Him with our choices, and honor Him with our lives.

Actions for God

DAY 1

JOSHUA 1:1-5 — God Places Joshua in Charge

- 1. What task does God give to Joshua? v. 2 How might Joshua have felt about this task?
- 2. What promises did God make to Joshua as he began to lead? vv. 3, 5
- 3. Joshua's new job consisted of leading 1-2 million people into a strange new land and conquering it. Scripture tells us that Joshua was Moses' constant companion. How do you think Joshua's faithful service to Moses helped prepare him for what God called Him to do?

DAY 2

JOSHUA 1:6-9 — God Tells Joshua to Be Strong and Courageous

- 4. Read verses 6-8. From verse 8, what are God's commands and God's promises to those that follow His commands?
- 5. How do you think God defines being prosperous and successful? How do you think reading, studying, memorizing and talking about God's Word will bring you success?

6. Read verse 9. It's not easy to follow God's commands and keep His Law, it requires courage. Can you think of an example or area in your life where you need to be strong and courageous to follow Him?

DAY 3 JOSHUA 1:10-18 — Joshua Organizes the Advance

7. Read verses 10-11. What was Joshua's first order of business? How long did he wait to begin the mission? Why was it important to get started right away?

8. Previously the tribes of Reuben and Gad and the half-tribe of Manasseh had arranged with Moses to make the land on the east side of the Promised Land their home. To receive this land, they had to help the other tribes enter and conquer the Promised Land. How do they respond to Joshua and his leadership? vv. 16-18

9. Do you think it was helpful for Joshua to be reminded to be "strong and courageous" by these men when he had already heard that from the Lord? Why?

DAY 4 JOSHUA 2:1-25 — Spies Meet Rahab

10. Read verses 1-6. Why did Joshua send out the 2 spies? What did Rahab do with the spies?

11. Read verses 9-11. What can we learn about Rahab from this statement? What do we learn about God from this statement?

12. Read verses 12-19. What did she ask the men to do for her because she helped them? How would Joshua's army know which house was Rahab's?

13. Read verses 23-24. This spy mission helped encourage the faith of the spies and the whole nation. How does seeing God working in your life and others encourage you?

14. Thinking over this whole event, what do you think would have happened if all the people of Jericho had been like Rahab and combined what they knew of God with faith? Why?

DAY 5 JOSHUA 1-2 — Wrap Up

15. How does God's promises in Chapter 1, verses 5 and 9 encourage you as you: face sin? temptations? difficult people? difficult situations?

16. God lists Rahab among the heroes of faith. (Hebrews 11:31) How does the fact that God used a prostitute to fulfill His plan encourage you? What does it tell you about His heart for all people?

TAKE AWAY

God encourages Joshua to be strong and courageous directly and through others 5 different times- Do you feel that same encouragement? How can you be strong and courageous this week?

BLESSING

Joshua and Rahab had a part in God's plan. Each believed God and served Him where He called them. We too can take part in God's plan. May we serve Him faithfully, glorifying Him in whatever we do.

Actions for God

God gave Joshua a mission to accomplish. His mission was to help the people possess the Promised Land, which had been promised to Abraham hundreds of years before. Joshua was to be strong and courageous. God repeats the command to be courageous to Joshua three times in Chapter 1.

Courage is an attitude, a decision. It is a decision to keep pressing on even in the face of danger and doubt. God would give him victory, but Joshua had to boldly lead the people into the land and into battle. He had to boldly and with faith obey what God had commanded him to do. We must also be strong and courageous and with faith

obey God's commands.

In chapter 2, Joshua sends spies into the land in preparation for the invasion. The spies are nearly discovered, but they find refuge with Rahab, a prostitute. Because she saves their lives, the spies reciprocate by agreeing to spare her and her family when Israel invades the city. The spies return to Joshua and share that "The LORD has given all the whole land."

The power of this event is that God would use someone like Rahab. He can use use anyone. He can redeem anyone. Rahab's story gives hope to every sinner that they too can be redeemed and fit into God's plan.

Miracles of God

JOSHUA 3:1-5 — Preparing to Cross the Jordan River

- 1. The Israelites are at the Jordan River. How will they know when and where to cross the river? v. 3 From the Dictionary and Exodus 25:10-22, what is the Ark of the Covenant?
- 2. Read verse 5. How can believers today approach God with a pure heart? Also see Romans 12:1-2. How does the media you use (i.e. phone, videos, games, apps...) effect your purity?

DAY 2

JOSHUA 3:6-17 — Crossing the Jordan River

- 3. Read verses 6-10. What does God tell Joshua? When Joshua speaks to the people, how does he honor God?
- 4. Read verses 11-17. When were the waters of the Jordan parted? What does this miracle tell you about God?
- 5. We are already seeing themes of God's presence and power in Joshua. How has God reminded you of both His presence and His power in your life?

DAY 3

JOSHUA 4:1-24 — Israel Enters the Promised Land

6. Read verses 1-9. What did the Lord tell Joshua to do? What was the meaning of the memorial for the Israelites?

7. How does remembering God's faithfulness to you and your faithfulness to Him impact you? Share ways that you can make memorials for what God does in your life.

8. Read verses 21-24. Why did God care what all the "all the nations of the earth" thought of Him? Does He still care? How should this affect what we do?

DAY 4

JOSHUA 5:1-15 — Israelites Observe Circumcision and Passover

- 9. From Joshua 4:13, where are the Israelites now and what are they ready to do?
- 10. Read verses 2-8. Circumcision was a practice God established to identify the men of Israel as His special people. It was a sign on their body that marked them that God had chosen them to belong to Him setting them apart. Why do you think God wanted the people to renew their commitment to Him in this way and at this time?

11. All the men of fighting age were made completely vulnerable and unable to fight for several days. What does this tell you about God? What can we learn from this?

- 12. Read verses 10-12. Review Passover in the Dictionary. From Exodus 12:21-27, why did Israel observe the Passover when they entered the land?
- 13. Read verses 13-15. Who was the visitor? v. 14 God was not on the Israelite's "side"; rather, the Israelites were fighting God's battles. Why do you think God sent this visitor to Joshua?

DAY 5 JOSHUA 3-5 — Wrap Up

14. What do you think God was trying to teach the Israelites by asking them to follow Him instead of trying their own ways to cross the Jordan River? How can you apply this to your own life?

15. God's story with the Israelites is symbolic of the Gospel: He frees us, gives Himself to us and delivers us. How do you see these promises shown in these chapters?

TAKE AWAY

He always provides for His people. How has God provided for you? Has He provided for you in any unexpected ways?

BLESSING

God proves His faithfulness again and again, but we tend to forget or don't recognize it, because it is not the way we pictured it. God is good and trustworthy. His timing and plans for our lives are always far better than our own.



Miracles of God

Upon reaching the Jordan River, Joshua and the Israelites set up camp and waited for God to make a way for them to cross over the river. On the third day, the people were to follow the Ark of the Covenant (where God's Presence lived) across on dry land. God told them what to do. They listened. They trusted. They obeyed. God speaks to us today as well. We must turn to His Word for guidance. How can we listen to Him better? How can we trust Him more? How can we obey better?

This miracle marked their entrance into the land. It marked the beginning of their possession of the land. The memorials God had them make were to remind them of God's power, God's presence, and God's promises. God wants us to remember all He has done in our lives as well.

The men were circumcised after crossing the Jordan. it was an outward symbol of their identification with God as His chosen people, Joshua and the people needed to obey God in faith. In the same manner, we are also called to obey God in faith. We don't know the future, but we know that God controls the future. Think back on your life. How has God provided for you?

DAY 1

JOSHUA 6:1-16 — God's Plan for Jericho

1. Read verses 1-5. How did Joshua know that they would win the battle at Jericho? What battle plan was given to Joshua?

- 2. Read verses 6-16. Why do you think God chose to have the Israelites conquer Jericho this way? What role or responsibility did the people have? What traits were needed to fulfill the role God had given to them?
- 3. According to Hebrews 11:30, what word describes the reason for the victory? What are you facing that requires this same quality?

DAY 2

JOSHUA 6:17-27 — Jericho Is Destroyed

- 4. Read verses 17-19. What are Joshua's orders about what is to be destroyed? Why? What was to be saved? Why?
- 5. Read verses 20-25. What happened to the town? What happened to Rahab and her family? What does this tell you about God?

6. What happened to Joshua because he obeyed God? v. 27

DAY 3 JOSHUA 7:1-26 — Disobedience Brings Defeat

- 7. Who was to receive all things from Jericho (6:17-19)?
 Read chapter 7, verses 1-5. How was God's command disobeyed? What was the result of this disobedience when Israel went against Ai?
- 8. Read verses 6-13. What does God say in verse 11? Why do you think the whole nation suffered for one family's sin? What can we learn about sin from this?
- 9. Read verses 16-26. What happened to Achan and his family because of his disobedience? What was God's response after the sin was eliminated?
- 10. Israel could not fight in God's power unless they walked in obedience to Him. How is this true in our lives as well?

DAY 4 JOSHUA 8:1-35 — God Brings Victory Over Ai

- 11. Read verses 1-2. How does Joshua know they will win over Ai this time? What does the fact that God allowed the Israelites to have the plunder from Ai when He didn't in Jericho, tell you about God?
- 12. Verses 10-29 tell the events of the battle. Did their battle plan work? What happened to Ai and to the king?

- 13. Read verses 30-35. What did Joshua do after the battle? Why do you think it was important for Joshua to review the law (blessings and curses) with the people?
- 14. All the words Joshua read can be summed up in Moses' words in Deuteronomy 11:26-28. In what way are these words valid for us today?

DAY 5 JOSHUA 6-8 — Wrap Up

15. Only God could do a mighty work as He did in Jericho. Do you stop to thank God and remember what He has done in your life? How can you take time this week to focus on God and what He has done in your life?

16. What is the relationship between obeying and honoring God and receiving God's blessings?

TAKE AWAY

Honoring God and loving His commands is a formula for success. Do this, and you can be victorious over the "walls" God wants to bring down in your life.

BLESSING

"Humanly speaking, it is impossible. But with God everything is possible." Matthew 19:26



Victory with God

Israel's victory over Jericho was through spiritual resources. Joshua trusted God. God also calls us to trust Him and not to rely on our limited understanding (Proverbs 3:5). Our trust in God honors and glorifies Him. As we depend on Him, He helps us to walk in His way (Psalm 37:3-5).

Important lessons from Jericho:

- 1. God's ways are not our ways and His thoughts are not our thoughts.
- 2. With faith in God anything is possible.
- 3. We cannot succeed without God. We must not rely on our own methods, strength and wisdom to fight our battles.
- 4. Whatever stands in our way, can become

stepping stones into our Promised Land. 5. When God faithfully provides for us, we must honor Him and show our thankfulness to Him.

After Jericho, Israel is shocked to lose a battle against Ai. God reveals that Israel had taken things devoted to Him from Jericho. Achan is identified as the guilty one and punished. With the truth uncovered and relationship restored, Israel attacks again. This time Ai is defeated.

In this lesson, we learn that God calls us to faithfulness and demands we serve Him only. God honors faithful obedience and dependence on him.

Battles for God

DAY 1 JOSHUA 9:1-15 — Israelites Are Deceived by the Gibeonites

1. Read verses 1-13. How did the Gibeonites trick Joshua and Israel?

2. Read verses 14-15. How did Joshua and the leaders respond? How should they have responded?

3. What can we learn from this passage? How can you know when to believe people and when not to? What does asking counsel from the Lord look like today?

DAY 2 JOSHUA 9:16-27 — Israelites Realize Their Mistake

4. Why do the Israelites keep their promise to not attack? What was the Gibeonites' punishment?

5. What lessons can you learn from how the Israelites handled this?

6. Why do you think the story of Gibeon is included in detail in the book of Joshua?

DAY 3 JOSHUA 10:1-27 — The Southern Kings Conquered

The people of Canaan were a threat to the purposes God had for His chosen people. Three Points: 1. The people in Canaan were unspeakably wicked. 2. The land rightfully belonged to the Israelites. God had promised it to them. Israelites were actually driving other people out of their own land. 3. The people had been given plenty of opportunity to turn to God, just as Rahab did.

7. Gibeon was a strong and important city. Five kings joined together to attack it. The odds were not good – 5 kingdoms to 2. How does verse 8 change the odds?

8. Read verses 9-11. What do you think this battle shows about God?

9. Read verses 12-14. What do you learn from this miracle about the power of God and the power of prayer?

10. Read verses 16-27. When Israel returned safely, what did Joshua do with the five kings? What do you think Joshua wanted to teach the people?

DAY 4 JOSHUA 11-12 — The Northern Kings Conquered

11. Joshua 11 & 12 tells about the battles to conquer more of the land. Israel was fighting for over 7 years. What does verse11:23 say?

(Not every small town and village had been conquered and occupied. That was up to each individual tribe to do in the land that was assigned to them.)

12. Numbers 33:56 says, "But if you fail to drive out the people who live in the land, those who remain will be like splinters in your eyes and thorns in your sides." God is against whatever takes His place in your heart/life. What tries to take the place of God in your life?

13. Chapter 12 shows God delivering on His promise to reclaim the land for His people. Why do you think a whole chapter was dedicated to listing every king the Israelites defeated in battle? How does this encourage you when you face problems in your life?

DAY 5 JOSHUA 9-12 — Wrap Up

14. What do we learn about Joshua's character from these chapters? How can you imitate these character qualities in your life?

15. What do we learn about God's character from these chapters? How does this affect your relationship with Him?

TAKE AWAY

We need to rely on the Lord and His grace each moment. We should pray and think carefully before making a promise, a commitment, a decision or a deal. Once you make it, keep it.

BLESSING

Victory is from the Lord. We may face obstacles and difficulties, even enemies, just as the Israelites did. But if we rely on the Lord, we will be victorious.

Battles for God

Joshua makes peace with the Gibeonites because he fails to seek God's guidance. Like Joshua, we tend to make wrong decisions and move away from God's plan when we don't ask for His direction. Let's ask God to forgive us, allow Him to direct us, and accept His perfect will for our lives.

God planned that the Israelites would triumph over their enemies and settle all the territory in the Promised Land. He called His people to trust and obey Him as He prepared the way of victory before them. He caused the Canaanites to fight against Israel, bringing about the Canaanites' destruction. He confused Israel's enemy, commanded

the forces of nature to help His people, and honored Joshua in a special way when He ordered the sun to stand still.

The One who led the Israelites and fought their battles prepares the way of victory before us each day. As we trust and obey Him, He guides us through difficult, sometimes dangerous, situations. If we have a relationship with Jesus, the same power witnessed by Joshua and the Israelites is available to us today (John 15:4-7). The One in whom we believe has been given "all authority in heaven and on earth" (Matthew 28:18). He is Lord of all and Lord forever. Will you rely on Him to fulfill His perfect plan for you?

God's Faithfulness

MEMORY VERSE: "Not a single one of all the good promises the Lord had given to the family of Israel was left unfulfilled; everything He had spoken came true." Joshua 21:25

DAY 1

JOSHUA 13-14:5 — Joshua Divides the Land

Chapters 13-19 describe how the Promised Land was to be divided among the 12 tribes.

- 1. Read verses 13:1-7. Joshua was now between 85-100 years old. What did God still want Joshua to do? v. 7 (2 1/2 Tribes-Reuben, Gad and ½ of Manasseh had received land east of the Jordan River.)
- 2. Read verse 14:1-5. What important lesson is learned from verse 5?
- 3. The yet to be conquered land was included in the divisions among the tribes. The Israelites allowed many of the Canaanite tribes to remain in the land even though God had repeatedly told them not to. Why is it so hard to do what we know is right? To stand up to peer pressure? What areas in your life have you let the ways of the culture replace what you know God wants for you?

DAY 2

JOSHUA 14:6-14 — Caleb Is Given His Inheritance

4. Read verses 6-12. Caleb was one of the original spies sent into the Promised Land. Who sent him on this task and how old was he at the time? How old is Caleb now and what proposal does he make to Joshua?

5. What do verses 9 and 14 tell us that Caleb had consistently done? Can you think of an example when you have been blessed for following the Lord?
DAY 3 JOSHUA 15-20 — Tabernacle and Cities Are Established 6. In chapters 15-19, the rest of the land is divided and allotted into portions. God kept His promises and provided for all the people. How does believing God's promises impact your daily life?
7. What inheritance did Joshua receive? When did Joshua receive his inheritance in relation to the rest of Israel? vv. 19:49-50 What do you learn about God from this?
8. Read verses 20:1-6. Cities of refuge were cities setup to ensure that God's principles of justice and fairness were kept throughout the land. What does this show us about God's character?
DAY 4 JOSHUA 21 — The Towns Given to the Levites 9. The tribe of Levi was the priestly tribe and were in charge of the cities of refuge. What did God give the Levi tribe for an inheritance? v. 13:14 Read verses 21:1-3. What do the leaders of the Levi tribe ask for? How did the Israelites respond to the request of the Levites?

10. Read verses 21:43-44. What specific promise did the Lord fulfill to Israel? What was life like for the Israelites after they conquered the land the Lord had promised them?

11. How are God's promises described in 21:45? What significance does that have on us as Christians?

DAY 5 JOSHUA 13-21 — Wrap Up

12. What have you learned from this lesson about God's faithfulness? What do you think we should do when it seems as if God's promises are not fulfilled? List at least three promises that God has given to you as a Christ follower.

13. In what ways was Joshua a good leader? How was Joshua's servant attitude revealed? What is one characteristic of Joshua that you would like to have in your own life?

TAKE AWAY

God keeps all His promises! What concrete action could you take this week to demonstrate your trust in God's promises?

BLESSING

God will not forget the good that you have done for Him. He will remember and reward you even if the good that you did for Him was done in secret.



God's Faithfulness

Even in old age, Joshua does not retire from the mission God entrusted to him. Although his army has overcome the Canaanite tribes, not all of the land has been possessed. Joshua carries out God's command to allocate this land to the twelve tribes of Israel for an inheritance. But Israel disobeys God's instructions by allowing some Canaanite tribes to remain in the land. The Israelites have grown lazy. They are tired of fighting; it is easier to let the Canaanite tribes stay instead of conquering all the land. Their involvement with these Canaanites would cause a long, painful struggle.

Caleb, now eighty-five years old, asks

Joshua for a portion of the Promised Land, and Joshua grants his requests.

After all the land was divided among the tribes, the Israelites gave a piece of land to Joshua. Joshua fought long and hard for his people and labored faithfully for God. He was successful as a leader because he obeyed God's commands.

The Lord gave them the land as He had promised. He gave them rest on every side. He gave their enemies into their hands. He fulfilled every one of His good promises to them. Not even one failed. What can we learn about the Lord from this? What lessons can we apply to our lives today?

Serve God

MEMORY VERSE: "We will serve the Lord our God. We will obey Him alone." Joshua 24:24

DAY 1

JOSHUA 22:1-5 — Joshua Sends the Tribes from the East Home

- 1. In what ways had the tribes of Reuben, Gad and ½ of Manasseh obeyed the Lord? What 5 things does Joshua charge them to do?
- 2. How do these instructions from Joshua answer the question: "What does God expect of me?" Why do you think God put these 5 elements in this order love, walk, obey, hold firmly, serve?

DAY 2 JOSHUA 22:6-34 — Tribes from the East Return Home

- 3. Read verses 10-14. What did these tribes do on their way home? How did the Israelites respond?
- 4. Read verses 21-29. What had the tribes actually built?

5. What principles can we learn from this disagreement/miscommunication?

6	. Israel's readiness to fight this battle on behalf of God's truth and holiness shows great courage,
	however, it must be done in godly ways. Share ideas on how Christians can stand up for their
	beliefs in this world.

DAY 3 JOSHUA 23 — Joshua's Farewell Address

- 7. Read verses 1-5. What does Joshua remind the rulers of the people?
- 8. Read verses 6-13. What were the positive things they were to do? What were the negative things they were to avoid?
- 9. Joshua knew Israel's weak spots for temptation. What are your weak spots for temptation?

10. Read verses 14-16. What do we learn about God's character? What is the other side of God's faithfulness which Joshua reveals? Why is it important for us to understand both sides?

DAY 4 JOSHUA 24 — The Lord's Covenant Renewed

- 11. Verses 1-13 tells of all the wonderful things the Lord did for His people throughout their history. Why did Joshua review the history of Israel? What lessons could they (and we) learn from their history?
- 12. What does Joshua challenge the people to do? vv. 14-15 What choice did Joshua make? Have you made your choice? Share what it means to you to serve the Lord.

- 13. Read verse 19-21. What do you think Joshua meant in verse 19 when he says, "You are not able to serve the Lord...?" What do you think God would say of your faith and commitment to Him?
- 14. Read verses 22-28. What did they do to show their obedience to the Lord over and above just saying they would serve Him? What was the covenant that was made? v. 24
- 15. Read verses 29-33. What did the Israelites do after Joshua died? v. 31

DAY 5 JOSHUA 22-24 — Wrap Up

- 16. God's blessing for obedience and cursing for disobedience was a specific part of Israel's covenant with God. Because of Jesus we relate to God under a different covenant but we do experience God's faithfulness to correct us as a loving Father. What does Galatians 3:13-14 tell us about the new covenant?
- 17. Why do you think Joshua was successful in leading Israel? Why is obeying God the way of life? (For further reference: John 8:31-32; John 14:23; John 15:14; Psalm 16:11)

TAKE AWAY

Choosing to follow the Lord is the most important decision you will make. You must choose to have a personal relationship with God on your own. Will you serve God or this world?

BLESSING

God's promises to us will be fulfilled according to His timing, not our timing. He wants to build our faith and increase our dependence on Him instead of our reliance on ourselves.



Serve God

Joshua told the Eastern tribes of Reuben, Gad and ½ of Manasseh that they had obeyed the Lord and now they could go home to be with their families. On their way home they built an altar to show they still belonged to Israel and still worshipped the Lord. Some of Western tribes didn't understand why they built this altar. They became angry and wanted to fight. When have you jumped to conclusions before you knew the facts?

Knowing he will soon die, Joshua summons the people and reminds them of all God has done for them. Joshua also warned about having idols. Many things dominate our lives and can become idols. It's what's in your heart - if it isn't Jesus, it's an idol. Replacing Him with idols produces emptiness and destruction.

Joshua and the Israelites made a covenant with God. The people promised to serve the Lord. God wants us to choose to serve and worship only Him. Our choices reflect what we truly value. When we truly serve Him, we give our whole lives to Him.

Joshua was a great leader. He had great faith and knew God would keep all His promises. There is much we can all learn from Joshua.
